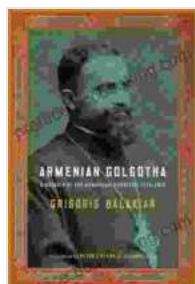


Armenian Golgotha: The True Story of a Priest who Transcended Pain and Suffering

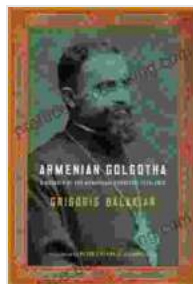
Fr. Mathai Joseph
